Dedication Day!

Their day had finally come! They had waited over a year, and put in hundreds of hours of work, but on a Sunday in March, it all came to fruition. Two Habitat partner families and dozens of well-wishers attended the dedication ceremony for the Port Colden duplex that is now home for a family of six, and a single mother and her son.



"This is an amazing day," gushed Pete, partner Dad of the family of six. "We took a shot in the dark and applied, we weren't sure if we would qualify, but we did. Added his wife Robin, "most surprising is how so many people who don't even know you do things for you. Half the workers I haven't even met and yet they were here every week working on our home."

Tammy, a partner Mom now living on the other side of the duplex, expressed amazement and gratitude. "This is quite a blessing for us. At times, we were staying with different friends or families, on couches, and in basements and spare bedrooms," she emphasized. "Now we have the security of our own space."

Melissa Flynn of the Family Support Committee thanked the Washington Woman's Club

and all others who donated housewarming gifts of small appliances, kitchen items and housewares. Dozens of volunteers attended the dedication ceremony. Vic Bozzuffi, Construction Supervisor, was happy that so many members of the build team were able to attend. Construction of the duplex was a new experience for the team as it was a departure from the simple, one story structures they usually build. The complexity of the architecture was necessary to fit in



with homes in the neighborhood, but presented quite a challenge for his team.



in Honduras through these efforts."

John Rolak, President of the WCHFH Board of Directors, officiated. "This is a big day, not only for our partner families, but for our affiliate because we have so many volunteers who contributed to making this day possible," he explained. "These are the thirteenth and fourteenth units we've built here in Warren County. However, through the Christian principle of tithing to Habitat for Humanity International, twenty-six homes have also been built

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Ben Eskow, Executive Director, recounted the effort involved in providing decent, affordable homes such as these in Port Colden. "When you're talking about a home like this, there's a lot that gets put into it," he explained. "Plumbers, electricians, roofers, foundation workers, sheet rockers, legal and financial professionals, fundraisers. We get help from churches, outside organizations, donors, sponsors. The list goes on and on. It really takes an army to pull off something like this."

The work of this Habitat affiliate continues, as they plan to break ground in May for a veteran family build. But this day belonged to Tammy, Robin, Pete and the children. Pete summed up the emotions of the day. "It's very, very, exciting. Unbelievable."

Meet the New Partner Family

Warren County Habitat for Humanity would like to introduce its newest partner family into our home building program!



Bob and Heather are the parents of a six year old girl and a one year old boy and currently reside in Washington. Robert is a parts manager at a local auto body shop and Heather is employed at a wildlife refuge.

WCHFH relies on donations of property on which to build the Habitat homes. This particular property, on Pleasant Valley Road in Washington, was donated with the understanding that the home would be built in partnership with a family which has served its country. Applications were limited to families where a member was either a veteran or an active duty military member of the armed forces.

Heather served six years in the Army National Guard and spent a yearlong tour of duty in Iraq

where she earned eleven awards and medals.

The WCHFH Family Selection team considers applicants living in inadequate or substandard housing conditions (unsafe, unhealthy, or overcrowded conditions), or expending more than 30% of their gross income on housing. Prospective partner families must have an income that will allow them to make the monthly payments required on the no-interest Habitat mortgage, and other living expenses, but not high enough to qualify for a conventional home mortgage.

They must be willing to fulfill the requirements of Habitat homeownership by putting in the mandatory "sweat equity" hours in the building of their own house, completing 250 hours of work per adult household member (18 and above). And families must have the ability to save money for a small down payment and closing costs, and participate in programs to learn and practice home repair, maintenance, budgeting, and other life skills.

Heather and Bob have met or agree to meet all conditions set forth and have been approved by the WCHFH Board. We welcome Robert, Heather and the children and look forward to starting this exciting new project!

The teams put in a lot of work but it was all worthwhile when we dedicated the first Habitat home in Warren County."

An Awesome Beams & Dreams Evening!

Continuing a tradition that goes back to the earliest days of WCHFH, the Beams and Dreams auction event was held on Saturday, April 22nd. This year's version of the signature fundraising event raised the bar for fun and philanthropic support.



Centered around dinner at the Hawk Pointe Golf Club in Washington, the event featured a live auction with rather unusual items, gift basket raffles, a silent auction, and a 50/50 drawing which paid out \$6,000 to the winners. "Many of the major expenses are front loaded in the build schedule. This gives us a chance to get construction underway almost immediately. Heather and Robert are understandably excited to start working on their new home as soon as possible."

Every year, affluent Americans buy 18 million new bicycles and discard millions of old ones, abandoning many more unused in basements, sheds, and garages. Most of these end up in our already overburdened landfills. Meanwhile, poor people overseas need cheap, nonpolluting transportation to get to jobs, markets, customers, and schools.

Pedals for Progress has received, processed and donated over 148,000 bicycles, 3,400 used

sewing machines, and \$10.8 million in new spare parts to partner charities in 38 developing countries. Pedals for Progress isn't just donating used bicycles: It's also helping developing world economies by promoting self-sustaining bicycle repair businesses.
